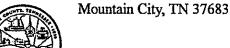

#### Attendance:

Our Youth Services program is going strong. Averaging 35-45 students a day. With new students still signing up. We had 3,506 student visits between Aug and Nov.

#### Demographics:

The after-school program serves ages 10- 18 and our summer day camp includes ages 6-9. The demographics for this group continue to be over 70% from low-income families. Our students represent a diverse range of race and ethnicity and must be enrolled and actively attending a school in Johnson County.

#### Education / Activities:

We continue to mentor our students and provide resources for tutoring if needed.

Veteran cards were made with The Quilt Guild. Every Monday we have a volunteer that comes and plays live music for our students. This individual also offers guitar lessons to those interested. This year we have partnered up with the Johnson County Arts Center. Every month a spotlight artist come and teaches the kids their specialty. Such as;

September, the kids did pottery

October, was quilting

November was landscape painting.

#### Updates:

With the two grants awards we have received, the center has been able to update with the following technology;

- 3 laptops
- 3 wireless keyboards and mouse
- 2 monitors
- 3 HDMI cords and adapters
- 1 Technician, to set up and install equipment

#### Success:

We could not achieve the work that is being done without the help of our volunteers, staff, and funding. Organizations contribute their efforts with supplemental education. Tennessee Promise students volunteer and interact with the children. Grants and contributions are essential to our program. Our community is supportive with cash and non—cash contributions. the week of April 1-7, 2024, is National Public Health Week, and the theme is "Protecting, Connecting and Thriving: We Are All Public Health" with the goal of recognizing the Whereas contributions in public health in improving the health of people in the United States and achieving health equity; and from 2019 to 2021, the life expectancy at birth for the population of the United States declined by 2.7 years, which is the biggest two-year decline in life expectancy since 1921-Whereas 1923; and there is a significant difference in health status, such as obesity, poor mental health, and drug use, among people living in rural areas compared with people living in urban areas, and this variance increases because rural residents are often more likely to face social determinants Whereas that negatively impact health, such as poverty, transportation barriers and lack of economic opportunity; and a person's health status can differ drastically by zip code due to differences in the built environment, environmental quality, community context, access to healthy food, access to Whereas education and access to health care; and preventable risk factors such as such as physical inactivity, poor nutrition, tobacco use, and excessive alcohol use are leading causes of chronic disease; and 6 in 10 U.S adults have a Whereas chronic disease and 4 in 10 have two or more; and chronic diseases cause 7 of every 10 deaths annually in the United States; and public health action, together with scientific and technological advances, has played a major role in reducing and, in some cases, eliminating the spread of infectious disease, and in Whereas establishing today's disease surveillance and control systems; and vaccination is one of the most significant public health achievements in history and has resulted in substantial decreases in the number of cases, hospitalizations, and deaths Whereas associated with vaccine-preventable diseases; and health care costs associated with vaccinepreventable diseases; and each 10-percent increase in local public health spending contributes to a 6.9-percent decrease in infant deaths; 3.2-percent decrease in deaths related to cardiovascular disease; Whereas 1.4-percent decrease in deaths due to diabetes; and 1.1-percent decrease in cancer-related dèaths; and public health professionals help communities prevent, prepare for, withstand, and recover from the impact of a full range of health threats, including disease outbreaks such as the Whereas

# A RESOLUTION URGING THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF TENNESSEE TO ENACT LAW TO FACILITATE NULLIFICATION OF CERTAIN FEDERAL ACTION AND FEDERAL OVERREACH TO UPHOLD STATE SOVEREIGNTY

WHEREAS, Federal overreach is running rampant in the United States of America impacting all aspects of life and governance; and

WHEREAS, all three branches of the United States government, executive, legislative, and judicial have, at times, exceeded their constitutional authority; and

WHEREAS, state and local governments suffer from interference by: federal actions, federal court decisions made concerning state and local affairs of government, bureaucratic rulemaking by federal agencies, and by federal law making outside of constitutional boundaries; and

WHEREAS, state and local government departments are often held hostage by federal funding mandates that are designed to control state and local policies by the power of the federal purse; and

WHEREAS, it may be necessary and proper from time to time for the state of Tennessee to nullify federal actions and overreach to maintain state sovereignty in areas of authority that are reserved to the states by the Tenth Amendment to the United States Constitution, which reads as follows: "The powers not delegated to the United States by the Constitution, nor prohibited by it to the states, are reserved to the states respectively, or to the people."

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED** by the Johnson County Board of Commissioners meeting this 21<sup>st</sup> day of March 2024 as follows:

**SECTION 1**, That the General Assembly of the state of Tennessee is urged to enact law to facilitate nullification of federal actions and overreach as it deems proper and necessary to maintain state sovereignty, giving deference to the language, or similar language, included

in the document attached hereto as Exhibit A, more specifically titled House Bill 726 and Senate Bill 1092, of the 2023 legislative session. The 2024 bills are HB2795 & SB2775 (link: <a href="https://wapp.capitol.tn.gov/apps/BillInfo/Default.aspx?">https://wapp.capitol.tn.gov/apps/BillInfo/Default.aspx?</a> BillNumber=HB2795&ga=113.

**SECTION 2**, That upon approval and signing of this resolution, the Johnson County Clerk is requested to transmit a copy of this resolution to the governor of the state of Tennessee, the state representatives and state senator that represent Johnson County, Tennessee, the speaker of the Tennessee House of Representatives, and the Lieutenant Governor of Tennessee.

To: Johnson County Mayor and budget committee:

The A.C.T.I.O.N Coalition/A.A.R.R.C ACTION Addiction Recovery Resource Center respectfully requests county opioid abatement funds be utilized to support recovery services for those in Johnson County who are seeking long term recovery from substance use disorder.

Beginning in June 2021 the A.C.T.I.O.N Coalition embarked on a journey to provide recovery support to Johnson County with the assistance of a Federal grant from the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Service Administration (SAMHSA). Over the 3-year period of this project we have established the ACTION Addiction Recovery Resource Center as a vital step in the recovery process. Located at 102 Village Square Lane, (next to 421 creamery) the AARRC has exceeded the goals of the grant by assisting to date 113 persons, over the 3-year period, as they worked to find a path forward either after incarceration or while living and working in our community. We have also maintained contact and support with 70% of those individuals at 6 months follow-up.

We have established relationships with the office of Probation/Parole, the Johnson County Jail and Sheriff's Department and the Department of Human Services to provide much needed support here in Johnson County to individuals who are, or have been, system involved. With transportation being an ongoing issue the services we have provided have eased some of the stress for these individuals and reduced recidivism rates in our community.

Since the beginning of the grant period we have trained 6 Certified Peer Recovery Support Specialists, 4 of whom work for the AARRC as well as 2 additional recovery coaches. These community members have combined over 15 years in recovery themselves and all have the heart for helping others find that path as well.

In 2022 we began the "Next Steps" program and developed a curriculum of learning that focuses on coping strategies, avoiding relapse triggers, and understanding the addicted brain. We have also utilized SMART recovery as well as R1 learning programs which are evidence based and well suited for those who are incarcerated.

In 2022 we onboarded a Hybrid Lifeline Coordinator through the Department of Human Services who is readily available to assist those in Johnson and Carter counties in need of treatment options not offered in our community. She not only works to access treatment options for

inpatient and recovery supportive housing but also provides crucial transportation options for those in need of these services.

As you can see, we have worked diligently to establish the AARRC as a positive support for Johnson County and I will be highlighting much more of the work being done through these amazing people at the March County Commission meeting.

We are asking that you consider providing some of the county budgeted Opioid Abatement funding for the 2024 year to the A.C.T.I.O.N Coalition/AARRC to continue this much needed work in our community.

2024 will bring us closer to obtaining a separate 501(c)3 non-profit status for the AARRC as a stand-alone entity and will expand our services to assist even more people with recovery support services.

Attached you will find a budget outlining the need for this funding and its purposes in our community for 2024.

We appreciate your time and consideration and hope that you will work toward helping us keep this vital program ongoing in Johnson County.

#### LEASE AGREEMENT

This Lease Agreement is made this 21<sup>st</sup> day of March, 2024 by and between **JOHNSON COUNTY**, party of the first part, hereinafter called "Lessor"; and **SKYLINE TELEPHONE MEMBERSHIP CORPORATION and its subsidiary, Skybest Communications, Inc.,** party of the second part, hereinafter called "Lessee";

The designation Lessor and Lessee, party of the first part, and the party of the second part as used herein shall include said parties, their heirs, successors, and assigns, and shall include singular, plural, masculine, feminine, or neuter as required by context.

#### **WITNESSETH:**

Lessor does hereby le	ease to the Lessee	and the Lessee does hereby accept as Lessee the property
as described in the at	tached Legal Desc	ription and Plat. This land was conveyed to Lessor by deed
recorded in Book	, Pages	of the Johnson County Registry.

This lease is executed upon the following terms and conditions:

- (1) The term of this Lease is for a period of ninety-nine (99) years (as approved by the Johnson County Board of Commissioners in their regular meeting on March 21, 2024) beginning on the 21<sup>st</sup> day of March, 2024, and running through the 21<sup>st</sup> day of March, 2123.
- (2) The rent for said ninety-nine (99) year term is to be the sum of \$1 and other valuable considerations, payable in full, in advance, the receipt of which is hereby acknowledged by the Lessor.
- (3) It is understood and agreed that the Lessee shall have the right to extend the term of this Lease for an additional term of ninety-nine (99) years beginning on the 21<sup>st</sup> day of March, 2123, provided the Lessee notifies, in writing, the said Lessor, or their heirs and assigns, of its intention to extend the term, said notice to be given at least ninety (90) days prior to the 21<sup>st</sup> day of March, 2123, and further provided the extension shall be under the same terms and conditions as provided herein except for

the rent. The rent to be paid by Lessee to Lessor shall be negotiated between the Lessor and the Lessee, however, it is agreed that the increase in the rent shall not exceed the United States Government consumer price index for all urban consumers in the South Region over the previous ninety-nine (99) year lease term.

- (4) Lessee shall use the demised premises for the purpose of installing and maintaining electronic equipment necessary to provide communications services to the property of the Lessor and the surrounding general area, said equipment to be housed in either a one (1) story structure or weather-proof cabinets, and no part of the demised premises shall be used for any other purpose without the prior written consent of the Lessor.
- (5) Lessor agrees to grant a ten (10) foot easement to any utility (electricity, water, etc) that requires such an easement for providing service to the Lessee's facilities.
- (6) Lessor does hereby grant a ten (10) foot easement to the Lessee for the installation of the fiber optic cables that will cross the Lessor's property and will be used for providing service to the community.
- (7) Lessee shall keep the demised premises in a state of good repair, maintenance and cleanliness, including all buildings, structures and equipment thereon. Lessee will be allowed to trim and/or remove any trees that overhang the leased property that could potentially be hazardous to life or property.
- (8) Lessor agrees to allow a crane to access the entire property for the purpose of lifting and setting the telecommunications shelter. Lessee agrees to repair any damage caused by the crane at Lessee's expense.
- (9) No waiver of any breach or breaches of any provision of this Lease shall be construed to be a waiver of any preceding or succeeding breach of such provision or of any other provision hereof.
- (10) This lease may be modified or amended only by a writing duly authorized and executed by both the Lessor and Lessee. It may not be amended or modified by oral agreements or understandings between the parties unless the same shall be reduced to writing duly authorized by and executed by both Lessor and Lessee.
- (11) This Lease shall be binding upon the parties and their successors and assigns.
